INTRODUCTION

Birth of the Mini.
Designed by Alec Issigonis for the British Motor Corporation (BMC), the first Mini was launched in August 1959. With Britain affected by fuel rationing following the 1956 Suez Crisis, the arrival of this economical new car was timely.



MINI MOMENT NO.1

Mini racing car evolves.
The Mini Cooper was developed in 1961 after a deal with racing constructor John Cooper recognised the Mini's racing potential. He agreed a deal with BMC to produce a racing Mini Cooper, each with a 1097cc engine.



MINI MOMENT NO.2

Minis at Monte Carlo.
Proving its racing-car potential, the Mini Cooper won the Monte Carlo Rally in 1963, 1964 and 1965. In 1965, Paddy Hopkirk was the winning lead driver in 1964, followed by Peter Stanger and Ruano Allwood two years later.

Dahlias



The Dahlia

The International Dahlia Register is one of nine Registers for which the RHS is responsible. There are more than 20,000 dahlia cultivars of various sizes and flower types. These break down into 10 categories relating to the characteristics of the flowers.

- GROUP 1**
Single Flowered Dahlias
have blooms with an outer ring of flat ray florets encircling a central disc.
- GROUP 2**
Avenue Flowered Dahlias
have blooms with an outer ring of flattened ray florets surrounding a dense group of tubular flowers.
- GROUP 3**
Collerette Dahlias
have blooms with an outer ring of flat ray florets surrounding a central disc.
- GROUP 4**
Waterlily Dahlias
have double blooms characterized by broad and sparse ray florets, which are straight, giving the flower a shallow appearance.
- GROUP 5**
Decorative Dahlias
have double blooms. The ray florets may be involute or slightly incurved, but not a blunt point.
- GROUP 6**
Ball Dahlias
have ball shaped double blooms. The ray florets are involute and tightly packed, giving the flower a rounded, rounded appearance.
- GROUP 7**
Pompon Dahlias
have double, spherical blooms of miniature size, with florets involute for their whole length.
- GROUP 8**
Cactus Dahlias
have double blooms, the ray florets are pointed, narrow and recurved for at least 50% of their length, either straight or incurving, giving the flower a prickly appearance.
- GROUP 9**
Semi-Cactus Dahlias
have double blooms, the ray florets are more than 25% and more than 50% of their length, but are not as pointed as the cactus type, and are not as recurved.
- GROUP 10**
Miscellaneous Dahlias
Any dahlia that does not fall into one of the above categories is classed as a miscellaneous dahlia.

The Dahlia Grower's Guide



Year one

AUTUMN
Choosing a location
Dahlias take the ground in vegetable and flower gardens, provided they have sufficient water, drainage and sunlight.
Planning your garden
Plants should be spaced 45 to 75cm apart depending on size. Rows should be 1.2m apart in order to provide good air circulation.

OCTOBER
Preparing the soil
Use this time to break up clumps and add compost, well rotted manure and a balanced fertiliser. The soil may be applied according to the manufacturer's recommended rates. Keep the soil moist and free from weeds and grass, preventing excess top growth.

MAY
Planting tubers
These should be planted horizontally, 10 to 15cm deep. Take care, as early growth is slow. Cover the tuber and compress the soil lightly. Water in well.

JUNE
Providing support
When the plants are 15-20cm tall use tomato cages or garden stakes to supply support. The stakes should be placed as the plant grows.

JUNE
Watering
Once the plants are growing rapidly water deeply every few days, but not before the first expected frost.

Year two

AUTUMN
Autumn digging
Cut dahlias to stem after the first frost. They are easily lifted and stored for winter and divided in the spring. If there is no ground frost and the soil has gone dry, the plants can be lifted and stored for winter.

WINTER
Winter storage
Ground freezing prevents digging. To store tubers pack in moist sand, vermiculite, wood shavings or straw in a cool, dark place. A fine dusting of sulphur powder will prevent moulding.

SPRING
Dividing the tubers
Tuber eyes are much easier to see in the spring, but small tubers have eyes that are not easily visible. Always leave newly divided tubers for 24 hours before planting to allow the cut surfaces to heal over.
